Public questions on Catholic spirituality, moral & spiritual problems

Q. What is the difference between gossip and venting to a confidant about things people have done? A. Answer by Catholic Answers: The Catechism explains when talking about when Gossip becomes sinful: Respect for the reputation of persons forbids every attitude and word likely to cause them unjust injury. He becomes quilty: - of rash judgment who, even tacitly, assumes as true, without sufficient foundation, the moral fault of a neighbor; - of detraction who, without objectively valid reason, discloses another's faults and failings to persons who did not know them; - of calumny who, by remarks contrary to the truth, harms the reputation of others and gives occasion for false judgments concerning them (2477). **Venting** in the sense of just getting something "off our chest" does not include any of the things listed above. So if we were to determine some key differences between venting and gossip I would say the former: Has no intention of what is said being spread to anyone else: Takes no joy in exposing someone else's fault(s); Does not carelessly relate false or incomplete information; Seeks no harm to another's reputation: Seeks no harm to another and no exaltation of self; Takes place at an appropriate time and place with someone who can reasonably be trusted.

Jesus' love for the defenseless — TODAY'S GOSPEL Luke 7: 11-16

The Widow of Naim

In ancient times it was common for a city to be surrounded by a high wall (Josh. 2:15). The wall was designed to provide protection against wild animals, criminals, and foreign



armies (Jer. 39:2). The city gate was also a place of business in Jewish cities. Jewish cemeteries were outside the city wall in order to avoid pollution by dead corpses (Josh. 8:29; Matt. 27:52-53). Therefore, it is not surprising that the dead man was being carried through the gate of the city. The Funeral — According to the ancient Jewish custom in Galilee, the parents of the dead person would walk in front of the funeral procession. The dead person would follow next, followed by friends and guests. Jewish custom

required that the dead person be washed, have his or her nails clipped, his or her hair cut, be anointed, the body wrapped in linen cloth, and his or her eyes closed. In Galilee the mother would walk in front of the funeral procession with the other family members behind her. Then the dead body followed in a cedar coffin, if possible, which was carried on a bier. After the dead person, relatives, friends, and mourners followed. The Mishnah prohibited the bier from being put down on the ground (Mishnah. (Moed Qatan 3.8). It was customary for the mourners to accompany the body to the grave. Jews did not cremate their dead, believing that cremation was a heathen practice. We are told that a large crowd followed behind the dead man. He must have been loved by many. Two large crowds came together, one following Jesus and the one that was part of the funeral procession. When Jesus saw the woman in front of the funeral procession with no one behind her and before the coffin. Jesus instantly realized that the woman was a widow and responded with compassion.

Saint of the Week

Pope St. John XXIII — October 11

Pope John XXIII was born **Angelo Giuseppe Roncalli** on November 25, 1881 – June 3, 1963) and reigned as Pope from October 28, 1958 to his death in 1963 and was canonized on April 27,



2014. He was the fourth of fourteen children born to a family of sharecroppers who lived in a village in Lombardy. He was ordained to the priesthood on August 10, 1904 and served in a number of posts, including papal nuncio in France and a delegate to Bulgaria, Greece and Turkey. In a consistory on January 12, 1953 Pope Pius XII made Roncalli a cardinal as the Cardinal-Priest of Santa Prisca in addition to naming him as the Patriarch of Venice. Roncalli was elected pope on October 28, 1958 at age 76 after 11 ballots. His selection was unexpected, and Roncalli himself had come to Rome with a return train ticket to Venice. He was the first pope to take the pontifical name of "John" upon election in more than 500 years, and his choice settled the complicated question of official

numbering attached to this papal name that arose because of the existence in the Middle Ages of an antipope of using the name. Pope John XXIII surprised those who expected him to be a caretaker pope by calling the historic Second Vatican Council (1962-1965), the first session opening on 11 October 1962. His passionate views on equality were summed up in his famous statement, "We were all made in God's image, and thus, we are all Godly alike." John XXIII made many passionate speeches during his pontificate, one of which was on the day that he opened the Second Vatican Council in the middle of the night to the crowd gathered in St. Peter's Square: "Dear children, returning home, you will find children: give your children a hug and say: This is a hug from the Pope!" Pope John XXIII did not live to see the Vatican Council to completion. He died of stomach cancer on June 3, 1963, four and a half years after his election and two months after the completion of his final and famed encyclical, Pacem in Terris. He was buried in the Vatican grottoes beneath Saint Peter's Basilica on June 6. 1963 and his cause for canonization was opened on November 18, 1965 by his successor, Pope Paul VI, who declared him a Servant of God. In addition to being named Venerable on December 20, 1999, he was beatified on September 3, 2000 by Pope John Paul II alongside Pope Pius IX and three others. Following his beatification, his body was moved on June 3, 2001 from its original place to the altar of Saint Jerome where it could be seen by the faithful. On July 5, 2013, Pope Francis - bypassing the traditionally required second miracle - declared John XXIII a saint, after unanimous agreement by a consistory, or meeting, of the College of Cardinals, based on the fact that **he was considered** to have lived a virtuous, model lifestyle, and because of the good for the Church which had come from his having opened the Second Vatican Council. He was canonized alongside Pope Saint John Paul II on April 27, 2014. John XXIII today is affectionately known as the "Good Pope" and in Italian, "il Papa buono". The Catholic Church celebrates his feast day not on the date of his death, but on October 11 - the day of the first session of the Second Vatican Council.

COLUMBUS DAY OBSERVED TOMORROW — On August 3, 1492, Italian navigator



Christopher Columbus set sail with three ships (Nina, Pinta & Santa Maria) and 90 men on a voyage of discovery sponsored by Queen Isabella of Spain. On October 12, 1492, the ships landed in the Caribbean Islands. This landing and subsequent expeditions became the foundation of the European colonies in the New World. Three hundred years later, in 1792, the Society of St. Tammany, or Columbian Order, organized a ceremony in New York City honoring Columbus and the anniversary of the first landing. On October 12, 1866, Italian-Americans in New York organized a celebration of the discovery of America, and

in 1869, Italian-Americans in San Francisco organized a similar celebration and called it "Columbus Day." Since 1920, the holiday has been celebrated annually. In 1937, President Franklin Roosevelt proclaimed every October 12 as "Columbus Day." *And in 1971, President Nixon declared the holiday would be celebrated on the second Monday in October.*


