




Q. Does baptism cause an ontological change in the baptized? If so, what is that change? A. Answer by Catholic Answers: An ontological change means a change of the very essence of a being. This is why the Church insists there can be only one baptism: once the ontological change takes place it cannot be repeated. The Catechism of the Catholic Church: 1265 Baptism not only purifies from all sins but also makes the neophyte "a new creature," an adopted son of God, who has become a "partaker of the divine nature," member of Christ and co-heir with him, and a temple of the Holy Spirit.

THE THIRD PASCHAL SUNDAY

The Sunday of the 7 Holy Myrrh-Bearing Women (Mark 15: 43 – 16:8)

The Third Sunday after Easter is dedicated to the memory of seven of the most dedicated and



courageous women of the New Testament. We know a great deal about the Twelve Apostles of Christ, but we know very little about the Myrrh-Bearing Women who were devoted to Christ equally as much as the Apostles themselves. They were with Jesus as He preached the message of Salvation. They were with Him when He was taken down from Calvary. It was these women who came to anoint His Sacred Body and prepare it for burial. This is why the Church refers to them as the "Myrrh-Bearing Women." Who were they? 1. Mary Magdalene, (Her feast day is celebrated July 22). This remarkable woman is the most famous of the Myrrh-Bearing Women of the New Testament. If you remember, it was she whom our Lord healed of a terrible illness which Holy Scripture describes as "being possessed by seven demons."

Holy Tradition tells us that after the Resurrection and Ascension of Christ, Mary Magdalene journeyed to Rome and convinced Emperor Tiberius that both Pontius Pilate and the archpriests of Jerusalem should be punished for their participation in the crucifixion of Christ. She later lived on the Greek island of Ephesus in the Christian community founded by St. John the Evangelist. Although she died on the island, her remains were eventually taken to the ancient of Constantinople. 2. Salome, the mother of James and John, the sons of Zebedee (her feast day is celebrated Aug. 3). Salome was a very saintly woman who loved Jesus very much. Her great love was shared by her two famous sons, James and John, two of the original Twelve Apostles of Christ. Tradition tells us that Salome enjoyed a very close relationship with the family of the Blessed Virgin Mary. She remained devoted to Mary after the Ascension of Christ. 3. Mary, the Mother of James and Joses, the wife of Cleophas (her feast day is celebrated May 23). Very little is recorded concerning her life: however, she devoted many years in the service of our Lord. 4. Johanna, the wife of Chuza, Herod Antipas' steward (her feast day is celebrated June 27). Johanna first heard of the coming of Christ during His first visit to the temple in Jerusalem. She became a true believer and assisted the Apostles during their first years as leaders of the new Faith. She was a woman of great courage. **5. Susanna**, (her feast day is celebrated on the Sunday of the Forefathers, which falls on the Sunday before Christmas). Susanna was a close friend of Mary Magdalene and 'was constantly by her side during her affliction. Susanna remained with the Apostles of Christ and shared in the work of spreading the message of salvation. She assisted with the serving of the "Communion Suppers" and administering to the sick and the aged. 6 & 7. Mary and Martha, the sisters of Lazarus - (feast day, June 4). Our Blessed Lord was very fond of Lazarus, and on many occasions visited his home In Bethany. The sisters of Lazarus, Mary and Martha, became followers of Christ and dedicated their lives to Him. After the miracle of the "Resurrection of Lazarus" by Jesus Christ, Mary and Martha returned with Jesus and His Apostles. They devoted their lives to the spreading of the new Faith. These are the famous "Seven Myrrh-Bearing Women" of the New Testament. These glorious ladies of the Church remained steadfast in their faith and brought glory to the Church of Christ. The Fathers of the Church consider them "equal to the Apostles."

The Holy Martyrs Timothy & His Wife, Maura May 3

Saints **Timothy and Maura** suffered for the faith during the persecution under the emperor Diocletian (284-305). Saint Timothy came from the village of Perapa (Egyptian Thebaid), and



was the son of a priest named Pikolpossos. He was made a reader among the church clergy, and also a keeper and copyist of divine service books. Saint Timothy was denounced as a keeper of Christian books, which the emperor ordered to be confiscated and burned. They brought Saint Timothy before the governor Arian, who demanded that he hand over the sacred books. They subjected the saint to horrible tortures for his refusal to obey the command. They shoved two red-hot iron rods into his ears, from which the sufferer lost his eyesight and became blind. Saint Timothy bravely endured the pain and he gave thanks to God, for granting him to suffer for Him. The torturers hung the saint head downwards, putting a piece of wood in his mouth, and they tied a heavy stone to his neck. Saint Timothy's suffering was so extreme, that

even those who tortured him implored the governor to ease up on the torture. Saint Timothy urged his wife not to fear the tortures, but to follow his path. Saint Maura answered, "I am prepared to die with you," and she boldly confessed herself a Christian. Arian commanded that the hair be torn from her head, and to cut the fingers off her hands. Saint Maura underwent the torment with joy and even thanked the governor for the torture, which she endured so that her sins might be forgiven. Then Arian gave orders to throw Saint Maura into a boiling cauldron, but she did not feel any pain, and she remained unharmed. Suspecting that the servants had filled the cauldron with cold water out of sympathy for the martyr, Arian went up and ordered the saint to splash him on the hand with water from the cauldron. When the martyr did this, Arian screamed with pain and drew back his scalded hand. Then, momentarily admitting the power of the miracle, Arian confessed God in Whom Maura believed as the True God, and he ordered her to be released. But the devil still held great power over the governor, and soon he again began to urge Saint Maura to offer sacrifice to the pagan gods. Having gotten nowhere, Arian was overcome all the more by a satanic rage and he came up with new tortures. Then the people began to murmur and demand a stop to the abuse of this innocent woman. But Saint Maura, turning to the people, said, "Let no one defend me. I have one Defender, God, in Whom I trust." Finally, after torturing them for a long time, Arian ordered the martyrs to be crucified. For ten days they hung on crosses facing each other. On the tenth day of martyrdom the saints offered up their souls to the Lord.

GCU was started by people taking care of each other and that's still our mission. 1870's onward Subcarpathian Rusyns from the Austro-Hungarian Empire (an area within Slovakia and Ukraine of today), immigrated to the US to start a better life. The largest segments settled in the anthracite areas near Scranton and Wilkes-Barre Pennsylvania, the bituminous

coal fields of Ohio, western Pennsylvania and West Virginia, and the steel mill towns near Pittsburgh. They spoke a different language, practiced a different religion, and followed a different set of customs. These differences led immigrants to band together and collectively establish brotherhoods to care for each other. Since most immigrants had dangerous jobs, the brotherhoods established funds for widows and children. The need for a comprehensive protection plan led to the establishment of the GCU on February 14, 1892. We pray that the God grant to its officers and membership many happy and blessed years because CHRIST IS RISEN!

EASTER DUTY PRECEPT — All Christian Faithful are OBLIGED to receive the Divine Eucharist when in danger of death AND during the Paschal (Easter) Period (Canon 708). In regards to the latter, this was traditionally known as the EASTER DUTY. When one is aware of Mortal (Deadly) Sin, a Sacramental Confession is necessary before receiving Holy Communion. Serious Sins are those fractures especially against the Ten Commandments and 6 Precepts of the Church, but not limited to them. If you have not attended to your Easter Duty Precept, the **Sunday of All Saints (June 11)** is the final day to take care of this important spiritual matter without incurring serious sin of omission. Use the special examination of conscience forms located in the vestibule and narthex of the Church to assist you in making a good confession of sins.
