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

Public questions on Catholic spirituality, moral & spiritual problems

Q. If a person is unconscious and receives the last rites but is unable to confess, is he cleansed of his sins? A. Answer by a Catholic Apologist: Yes, assuming his soul is properly disposed. In other words, assuming he has sorrow for his sins. The Church teaches: Individual and integral confession and absolution constitute the sole ordinary means by which a member of the faithful who is conscious of grave sin is reconciled with God and with the Church. Physical or moral impossibility alone excuses from such confession, in which case reconciliation may be attained by other means also. The Catechism of the Catholic Church states: "The special grace of the sacrament of the anointing of the sick has as its effects: the forgiveness of sins, if the sick person was not able to obtain it through the sacrament of penance" (CCC 1532).

TODAY'S GOSPEL MEDITATION

Jesus stops for, responds to, reaches out to!

GOSPEL Luke 18:35-43

Now, to the folks in Jericho that day, this blind man was a noisy, stubborn nuisance.



They want to make a good impression on Jesus, and here's this man screaming obnoxiously. The people see nuisance. Jesus sees need. He knows that behind those screams is a man with a desperate need. And the man everybody else is trying to shut up Jesus stops for, responds to, reaches out to. When you try to see the need behind someone's deed, it changes the way you treat that person. There's probably someone in your world who needs that kind of understanding from you right now. It may be

someone who has hurt you deeply . . . mistreated you even attacked you. You may be increasingly annoyed or irritated or angry with someone whose attitude or actions or approach really rub you the wrong way. But there's a good chance there's pain underneath the way they are. Past battles that have almost programmed them to respond in a way that they think will protect them from more pain. Sometimes when people are bleeding emotionally, they bleed on us. If that person was injured in front of your house and physically bleeding, you'd respond with compassion and you'd do all you could to stop the bleeding. When you try to understand the needs behind their deeds, you can finally respond as Jesus told us to - "Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you" (Luke 6:27, 28). That person you struggle with doesn't need any more wounds . . . they need someone who will, in Jesus' love, help heal those wounds.

Why we refer to the Eucharist as an "unbloody sacrifice"?

First, the Eucharist or sacrifice of the Mass (Divine Liturgy) is not a re-sacrificing of

Jesus. Jesus offered himself once for all (Heb. 7:27, 9:28), so the Mass (Divine Liturgy) is called unbloody because Jesus does not suffer and shed his blood anew. However, while Jesus suffers and dies only once, his sacrifice as a whole culminated in everlasting glory in the heavenly sanctuary and is made sacramentally present at every Mass (Divine Liturgy). The Catholic Church describes the Eucharist as "the source and summit of the Christian life" (CCC 1324). It's the source



because the Eucharist enables us to make present and offer anew Jesus Christ's one redemptive sacrifice of Calvary, which began with his Passion (CCC 1362-68; 1341). It's the summit because the Eucharist is truly a foretaste of heaven, in which we partake of Jesus' body and blood as heaven and earth become most profoundly one. The Eucharist is a communion sacrifice, which means we partake of Jesus in a way similar to how the ancient Israelites ate the flesh of the Old Covenant Passover lambs. But the New Covenant Passover is much more profound, for there is only one Lamb—the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world (John 1:29, 35-36)—and eating Jesus' body and drinking his blood provides eternal life (John 6:52-59; see 1 Cor. 13:23-34). Jesus' one sacrifice is made sacramentally present and offered anew at every Mass (Divine Liturgy) according to the order of Melchizedek, i.e., under the forms of bread and wine.

SOLEMN HOLY DAY THIS WEEK

The Encounter of the Lord - February 2

The fortieth day after His birth, the All-Holy Virgin brought her Divine Son into the



Temple of Jerusalem, in accordance with the Law, to dedicate Him to God and to purify herself. "Consecrate to me every first-born that opens the womb among the Israelites both of man and beast, for it belongs to me" (Exodus 13:2 & Leviticus 12:2-7). Even though neither the one nor the other was necessary, nevertheless the Lawgiver did not, in anyway, want to transgress His own Law whom He had given through Moses, His servant and prophet. At that time, the high-priest Zachariah, the father of John the Forerunner, was on duty in the Temple ["serving as a priest before God in the order of his division" St. Luke 1:8]. Zachariah placed the Virgin, not in the temple area reserved for

women but rather in the area reserved for virgins. On this occasion, two unusual persons appeared in the Temple: the Righteous Simeon and the Prophetess Anna, the daughter of Phanuel. The righteous Simeon took the Messiah in his arms and said: "Now, Master, You may let Your servant go in peace, according to Your word, for my eyes have seen Your salvation" (St. Luke 2: 29-30). Simeon also spoke the following words about the Christ-child: "Behold, this child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel" (St. Luke 2:34). Then Anna, who from her youth served God in the Temple by fasting and prayer recognized the Messiah and glorified God and proclaimed to the inhabitants of Jerusalem about the coming of the long-awaited One. The Pharisees present in the Temple, who having seen and heard all, became angry with Zachariah because he placed the Virgin Mary in the area reserved for virgins and reported this to King Herod. Convinced that this is the new king about whom the Magi from the east spoke, Herod immediately sent his soldiers to kill Jesus. In the meantime the Holy Family had already left the city and set out for Egypt under the guidance of an angel of God. The Feast of the Encounter of our Lord in the Temple was celebrated from earliest times but the solemn celebration of this day was established in the year 544 A.D. during the reign of Emperor Justinian.

FEAST OF THE 3 HOLY HIERARCHS ON WEDNESDAY — In the month of January, each of these saints has their own feast day. St. Basil the Great, January 1; St. Gregory the



Theologian, January 25; and the transposition of the relics of St. John Chrysostom, January 27. This combined feast day, January 30, was instituted in the eleventh century during the reign of Emperor Alexius Comnenus. At one time a debate arose among the people concerning who of the three is the greatest? Some extolled Basil because of his purity and courage; others extolled Gregory for his unequaled depth and lofty mind in theology; still others extolled Chrysostom because of his eloquence and clarity in expounding the Faith. Thus some were called Basilians, others Gregorgians, and the third were called Johannites. This debate was settled by Divine Providence to the benefit of the Church and to an even greater glory of the three saints. Bishop John of Euchaita (June 14) had a vision in a dream: At first, all three of these saints appeared to him

separately in great glory and indescribable beauty, and after that all three appeared together. They said to him, "As you see, we are one in God and there is nothing contradictory in us; neither is there a first or a second among us." The saints also advised Bishop John that he write a common service for them and to order a common feast day of celebration. Following this wonderful vision, the debate was settled in this manner: January 30 would be designated as the common feast of these three hierarchs. The Greeks consider this feast not only an ecclesiastical feast but their greatest national school holiday.

SOLEMN BLESSING OF CANDLES THIS WEEK — On Saturday, Feb. 2, we commemorate

the Solemn Feast of THE ENCOUNTER OF THE LORD. The Righteous Simeon was promised by God that he would not pass onto eternity until he had first seen the Messiah in the flesh. It is a day that Byzantine Catholics acknowledge Jesus coming to ENCOUNTER His people. Christ is the revelation light to the Gentiles and the glory of His people Israel. Jesus comes as the LIGHT OF THE WORLD. It is on this day that candles are solemnly blessed. Although the Church will provide candles, you may also wish to bring your own for the solemn



blessing. Please be advised: We start 10 minutes earlier for the Solemn Blessing.
