



Public questions on Catholic spirituality, moral & spiritual problems

Q. Is purgatory a punishment? Is it a hell-like existence? **A.** Answer by a Catholic Apologist: Purgatory is a final purification to achieve the holiness (final theosis) necessary to enter heaven—this is entirely different from the punishment of hell. The Catechism of the Catholic Church explains: "... we must understand that sin has a double consequence. Grave sin deprives us of communion with God and therefore makes us incapable of eternal life, the privation of which is called the "eternal punishment" of sin. On the other hand every sin, even venial, entails an unhealthy attachment to creatures, which must be purified either here on earth, or after death in the state called Purgatory. This purification frees one from what is called the "temporal punishment" of sin. These two punishments must not be conceived of as a kind of vengeance inflicted by God from without, but as following from the very nature of sin. A conversion which proceeds from a fervent charity can attain the complete purification of the sinner in such a way that no punishment would remain. (CCC 1472)." Unlike the damned, those in the state of purgatory have the joy of knowing that, upon purification, they will enter eternal life in heaven.

SUBJECT MATTER DISCUSSED AT PAC/FAC MEETING — At last Sunday's PAC/FAC Meeting, July

29, 2019, discussion on the following highlighted topics were reviewed (1) Forthcoming Restroom Projects for the Church & Gym. This project is being sponsored by the Pirohi Project. Thus far our Architect, Joel Farkas was only able to get one General Contractor to submit a working bid; one is still pending. (2) Church roof, which includes fixing shingles on the large area at the top, and the flat roof over the side porch area has



been repaired due to rain water entering the interior of the second elevator entrance. Also, the roof at the school side entrance had to be replaced due to years of wear and tear. Kenyon Roofing's total cost for these combined projects was \$10,775.00; (3) Tabs Asphalt contracted in June for our Church Parking Lot, by repairing cracks, surface sealed, and parking lot lines replaced for a total of \$2,600.00. The funds from the Pirohi Project paid the invoice. We thank those who worked on this part time Project making these necessary repairs possible; (4) Agreed to present parishioner, Luke lyengar, who was recently enrolled as a first year seminarian, with a check of \$300.00 to assist him with the purchase of books and needed capital for the semester academic courses; (5) Discussed the commencement of the Eastern Christian Formation (E.C.F.) on Sunday, September 15, 2019; (6) Placement of the school sign on the side of the school building since replacing it on the school side entrance would void the warranty of the new roof. It will face Helen Street for all to see. It is being preserved as a part of the building's history; and (7) Bethlehem Artifact will present items for purchase from the Holy Land the Weekend of November 23-24, 2019. This will enable us to purchase items for Christmas.

BACK FLOW VALVE INSTALLED THIS PAST WEEK - Matt Mertz Plumbing installed the required back flow valve just outside the ladies washroom area on Wednesday. The Pittsburgh Water Authority requires all commercial buildings (including

Many Catholics are unaware of how our Faith directs us to respond in critical life situations. Perhaps, you may have been presented by a health care institution with a form to mark off the care you wish to receive. Be advised that hydration and nutrition are not necessarily extraordinary means but Ordinary Means in most cases! It is ERRONEOUS to accept the statement that we are not to feed or hydrate human life since it is a process of dying! If we are going to succumb to biological death it must be due to the disease and not from a lack of hydration and nutrition. This is why Catholic Health Services forms were drawn up and given the blessing of our hierarchy. USE THIS FORM WHEN ASKED! 8th SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Christ's Compassion: Feeding the Multitude (Matthew 14: 14-22)

The great New Testament miracle of the multiplication of the loaves reminds us of another miracle, the one performed by God's Prophet

Elijah. Elijah had told King Ahab and his wife Jezebel that God would punish the apostasy of Israel and its ruler for worshiping the heathen sun-god Baal. This punishment would be in the form of a long drought and famine. During the drought, Elijah went to Zerephath, where he was hospitably received by a poor widow and her son, who offered

him their last meal. He rewarded their charity by miraculously increasing their flour and oil - just enough each day to feed them - throughout the three-and-a-half years the famine lasted.

In the churches of our metropolitan province, we are reminded of this great miracle every time that there is festive anointing - 'mirovanije' - on the occasion of special holydays. During the Vesper Service preceding the feast day, the priest blesses five loaves of bread, and the prayer of blessing mentions the miracle of the feeding of over 5.000 people.

Sacramental Bread — Why did Our Lord Jesus perform this great miracle of feeding over 5,000 people? He wanted to prepare them for still another miracle, an even greater one, the one that He performed at the Last Supper, when He changed the substance of bread into His own Body. This He did when He blessed the bread, saying: "Take and eat: this is My Body," and changed the wine into His Precious Blood. He thus instituted the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist, through which we today receive the spiritual nourishment necessary for our souls. Jesus Himself said: I am the Bread of Life. He who comes to Me shall never hunger, and he who believes in Me shall never thirst." In order to unite us with Him spiritually, Our Lord enables us to receive Him every time the Divine Liturgy is celebrated, for the nourishment and salvation of our souls. May we always approach Him worthily and thank Him, collectively and personally, for this Most Precious Gift!



Saint of the Week

The Holy Apostle Matthias — August 9

Matthias was born in Bethlehem of the tribe of Judah. He studied with St. Simeon the



"Receiver of God" in Jerusalem. When the Lord went out to preach about the Kingdom of God Matthias then joined the others who loved the Lord, for he himself loved Him with all his heart and with delight did he hear His words and witnessed His works. In the beginning, Matthias was numbered among the Seventy Lesser Disciples of Christ but following the resurrection of the Lord, since the place of Judas was vacated, the apostles, by drawing lots, chose this Matthias in place of Judas as one of the Twelve Great Apostles. "And they appointed two, Joseph called Barsabbas, who was surnamed Justus and Matthias. And they prayed and said: 'You Lord, who knows the hearts of all men, show which of these two You have chosen, that he may take part of this ministry

and apostleship from which Judas by transgression fell that he might go to his own place' " (Acts 1:23-26). Receiving the Holy Spirit on Pentecost, Matthias set out to preach the Gospel, first of all in Judea and after that in Ethiopia where he endured great tortures for the sake of Christ. It is held that he preached throughout Macedonia where they wanted to blind him but he became invisible to his torturers and thus escaped danger. Being in prison, the Lord appeared to him, encouraged him and freed him. Finally, he returned again to his work in Judea. There he was accused and brought to court before the high priest Ananias before whom he fearlessly witnessed for Christ. Ananias, the same Ananias, who before that, slew the Apostle James, condemned Matthias to death. They led Matthias out, stoned him to death and, after that, decapitated him with an axe (this was the Roman manner of killing a person who was sentenced to death and the hypocritical Jews applied this method on the dead man so as to show the Romans that the slain person was an enemy of Rome). Thus, this great apostle of Christ died and took up habitation in the eternal joy of his Lord

General Announcements

TRANSFIGURATION: A SOLEMN HOLY DAY — Christian theology assigns a great deal of

significance to the Transfiguration, based on multiple elements of the narrative. In Christian teachings, the Transfiguration is a pivotal moment, and the setting on the mountain is presented as the point where human nature meets God: the meeting place for the temporal and the eternal, with Jesus himself as the connecting point, acting as the bridge between heaven and earth. The Transfiguration not only supports the identity of Jesus as the Son of God (as in his Baptism), but the statement "listen to him", identifies him as the messenger and mouth-piece of God. The significance of this identification is enhanced by the presence of Elijah and Moses, for it indicates to the apostles that Jesus is the voice of God "par excellence", and instead of Elijah or Moses, he should be listened to, surpassing the laws of



Moses by virtue of his filial relationship with God. In 2 Peter 1:16–18, echoes the same message: at the Transfiguration God assigns to Jesus a special "honor and glory" and it is the turning point at which God exalts Jesus above all other powers in creation, and positions him as ruler and judge. The Transfiguration also echoes the teaching by Jesus (as in Matthew 22:32) that God is not "the God of the dead, but of the living". Although Moses had died and Elijah had been taken up to heaven centuries before (as in 2 Kings 2:11), they now live in the presence of the Son of God, implying that the same return to life can apply to all who face death and have faith. The faithful bring Grapes and other fruits of the summer harvest to be blessed. From grapes come the wine at which the transfigured Jesus appears in the Eucharistic Form; and the fruits symbol God's bounty to us His people and His desire to feed us.
