



Public questions on Catholic spirituality, moral & spiritual problems

Q. Is it very wise to attend a nondenominational bible study? Three non-denominational people came up to me and tried to convert me to their religion. They pretty much just attacked the Catholic Church.... I tried my best to support where they were wrong and why the church is the way it is, but had a hard time defending some things. All three of the evangelists were converted from Catholicism to this non-denominational Christianity.... They invited me to a bible study. Do you think it's very smart for me to attend? A. Answer by a Catholic Apologist: It is quite clear that the intention of the "Bible study" is to convert Catholics away from the Church. So I would not recommend attending. In general, ecumenical Bible studies can be difficult. As Catholics we believe that tradition is indispensable for interpreting the Bible, whereas most Protestants would reject tradition as a lens for Biblical interpretation. So we have an irreconcilable difference with Protestants that goes right to the core of how to understand the Bible.





COLUMBUS DAY IS A U.S. HOLIDAY — It commemorates the landing of Christopher Columbus in the Americas in 1492, and Columbus Day 2019 occurs on Monday, October 14. It was unofficially celebrated in a number of cities and states as early as the 18th century, but



did not become a federal holiday until 1937. For many, the holiday is a way of both honoring Columbus' achievements and celebrating Italian-American heritage. But throughout its history, Columbus Day and the man who inspired it have generated controversy. and many alternatives to the holiday have proposed since the 1970s. Christopher Columbus was an Italianborn explorer who set sail in August 1492, bound for Asia with backing from the Spanish monarchs King

Ferdinand and Queen Isabella. Columbus intended to chart a western sea route to China, India and the fabled gold and spice islands of Asia. Instead, on October 12, he landed in the Bahamas, becoming the first European to explore the Americas since the Vikings established colonies in Greenland and Newfoundland during the 10th century.

The True Veneration of Icons

The 7th Ecumenical Council of Nicea

TODAY'S GOSPEL John 7: 1-13 — Source: Wikipedia

The Seventh Ecumenical Council took place in Nicea in 787 AD, and is also known as the Second Council of Nicaea. The last of the seven Ecumenical Councils dealt with the icons. The Controversy: Disputes concerning the Person of Christ did not end with the Sixth Council in 681 AD,



but continued through the eighth and ninth centuries. This time, the controversy focused on icons-pictures of Christ, the Theotokos, the saints, and holy events—and lasted for 120 years, starting in 726 AD. Icons were kept and venerated in both churches and private homes. The two groups in the controversy were: Iconoclasts: also called "icon-smashers," they were suspicious of any art depicting God or humans; they demanded the destruction of icons because they saw icons as idolatry. Iconodules: also called "venerators of icons." they defended the place of icons in the Church. The controversy, however, was more than a struggle over different views of Christian art. Deeper issues were involved, and it is these the Council addressed: The character of Christ's human nature; The Christian attitude toward matter; The true meaning of Christian redemption and the salvation of

the entire material universe. The controversy falls into two periods: From 726 AD when Leo III began his attack on icons until AD 780 when Empress Irene ended the attacks. Again from 815 AD through 843 AD when Empress Theodora stamped out the attacks permanently. The iconoclasts had support from both inside and outside the Church. Outside the Church, there may have been influence from Jewish and Muslim ideas, and it is important to note that just prior to the iconoclast outbreak Muslim Caliph Yezid ordered the removal of all icons with his territory. Inside the Church there had always existed a "puritan" outlook which saw all images as latent idolatry. Largely through the work of St. John of Damascus (c. 676-749), who, ironically, was housed in Muslim-controlled lands and therefore outside the reach of the Empire, the iconodules' position won out. He addressed the charges of the iconoclasts thus: Concerning the charge of idolatry: Icons are not idols but symbols, therefore when an Orthodox venerates an icon, he is not quilty of idolatry. He is not worshipping the symbol, but merely venerating it. Such veneration is not directed toward wood, or paint or stone, but towards the person depicted. Therefore, relative honor is shown to material objects, but worship is due to God alone. We do not make obeisance to the nature of wood, but we revere and do obeisance to Him who was crucified on the Cross... When the two beams of the Cross are joined together I adore the figure because of Christ who was crucified on the Cross, but if the beams are separated. I throw them away and burn them. —St. John of Damascus

Saint of the Week — October 15

Venerable-Martyr Lucian, Presbyter of Antioch

Lucian was born of noble parents in the Syrian city of Samosata. In his youth, he acquired a very broad education, both secular and spiritual. He was a man distinguished in learning, as well as in the austerity of his ascetic life. Having




distributed his goods to the poor, Lucian supported himself by compiling instructive works, and thus fed himself by the work of his hands. He performed a great service to the Church in that he corrected many Hebrew texts in Holy Scripture (that heretics, in accordance with their own false teaching, had distorted). Because of his learning and spirituality, he was ordained a presbyter in Antioch. During Maximian's persecution, when St. Anthimus of Nicomedia and St. Peter of Alexandria were tortured, St. Lucian was on the list of those the emperor wanted to kill. Lucian fled the city and hid, but an envious heretical priest, Pancratius, reported him. The persecution was

horrible and not even young children were spared. Two boys who did not want to eat food sacrificed to idols were thrown into a boiling bath, where in torments they gave up their holy souls to God. A disciple of Lucian named Pelagia (October 8) preserved her virginal purity from dissolute attackers by praying to God on her roof-top: she gave up her soul to Him, and her body fell from the roof. Lucian was brought to Nicomedia before the emperor. Along the way, his counsels converted forty soldiers to the Christian Faith, and all died a martyr's death. Following interrogation and flogging, St. Lucian was cast into prison where he suffered starvation. St. John Chrysostom writes of St. Lucian: "He scorned hunger: let us also scorn luxury and destroy the power of the stomach that we may, when the time that requires such courage comes for us, be prepared in advance by the help of a lesser ascesis, to show ourselves glorious at the time of battle." He received Holy Communion in prison on the Feast of Theophany, and on the following day rendered his soul to God. St. Lucian suffered on January 7, 311 A.D.
