Public questions on Catholic spirituality, moral & spiritual problems Q. What is the use of praying the Rosary every day? **A. Catholic Answers Apologist:** Faithful repetition of the Rosary brings peace to the heart and abundant grace to the soul. Praying the Rosary inspires the heart with a more sincere love for the Holy Trinity and Our Lady. When we meditate on the twenty mysteries of the Rosary, we grow in love and understanding of the joyful, luminious, sorrowful and glorious events in Jesus' life. Anytime we can reflect on Jesus, we are sure to grow in holiness (CCC 2708) You may hear some Protestants say that repetitious prayer, like the Rosary, is condemned by Jesus (Mt. 6:7). This is not true. What is condemned in that verse is "vain" repetition (CCC 2668). This is meaningless repetition, not meaningful repetition. This verse was condemning a specific ritual of invoking pagan gods with a litany of specific names. It is not a condemnation of the Rosary, which was not developed for another thousand years. Regarding repetitious prayer, Jesus Himself prayed the same prayer three consecutive times to His Father in the Garden of Gethsemane (Mt 26: 39-44). Also, the angels in Heaven are continually repeating "Holy, Holy, Holy is the Lord God Almighty (Rev 4:8). Repetition is not condemned, only mindless or vain prayer.

Mexican Priest Who Survived COVID: God Acts In the Midst of Suffering

MEXICO CITY, Mexico - When Fr. Antonio Pérez Hernández was recently hospitalized with COVID-19, he said he was able to witness firsthand how God is present in the midst of suffering. The priest shared his experience in a recent video posted by the archdiocese of Tlanepantla, Mexico, where he serves. After Father Pérez fell sick with the virus, he was admitted to a public hospital where he shared a room with other patients, some of whom died. "When I was in that place, there came a time when I did feel like God could call me into his presence," he said. "And that's when you discover abandonment, the total abandonment of saying to the Lord: 'Here I am, if you want to call me, I am willing; if you want to leave me, I am also willing. I only ask that you please give me the strength to give absolution and attend to my brothers who are suffering from the disease just like I am'." The priest said that despite the illness, his experience at the hospital was beautiful and freeing, because he "felt the loving presence of God." While at the hospital, Father Pérez said he always introduced himself as a priest and gave absolution to the sick who requested it. He said he found Christ in the sick patients and was reminded that "we all need Jesus." He witnessed four patients die, but said that after giving them absolution, he could see that "they were comforted, they were at peace." Through constant prayer, the priest said he watched the hospital rooms be transformed into places of peace where the presence of God could be felt and encountered. When Father Pérez was discharged, he said some people told him, "Father we're going to miss you, you gave us hope, you made us feel Christ in the midst of all this." "I said to them: 'Christ is going to stay with you. I am leaving, but Christ remains. God is not leaving you alone'," he continued. Father Pérez believes God is using the pandemic to heal hearts. "God is making us see what is truly important," he said. "Those of us who were there had no contact with family. Those who died, died without having any contact with the family," father Pérez recounted, and stressed the importance of "valuing the presence of the family, valuing friends, valuing life." "There comes a time when you only have your hospital gown, you have nothing," he said, but at that moment "you experience that abandonment of saying to the Lord: 'Lord, I have you. THE SEVENTH PASCHAL SUNDAY

The Core of Our Common Faith (first read John 17: 1-13)

Fathers of the 1st Ecumenical Council

Today, we are commemorating the Fathers of The First Council of Nicea held in the year 325 AD. It is the first ecumenical council of the Catholic Church. *Most*



significantly, it resulted in the first, extra-biblical, uniform Christian doctrine, called the Nicean Creed. With the creation of the creed, a precedent was established for subsequent local and regional councils of Bishops (Synods) to create statements of belief and canons of the true faith — the intent being to define unity of essential beliefs for the whole of Christendom. The council did not create the doctrine of the deity of Christ but it did settle, to some degree, the debate within the Early Christian communities regarding the divinity of

Christ. This idea of the divinity of Christ, along with the idea of Christ as a messenger from God (The Father), had long existed in various parts of the Roman Empire. The divinity of Christ had also been widely endorsed by the Christian community in the otherwise pagan city of Rome. The council affirmed and defined what it believed to be the teachings of the Apostles regarding who Christ is: that Christ is the one true God in deity with the Father. Derived from Greek "ecumenical" meaning "worldwide or universal." One purpose of the council was to resolve disagreements arising from within the Church of Alexandria over the nature of the Son in relationship to the Father. Saints Alexander of Alexandria and Athanasius claimed that Christ is God and the popular presbyter Arius, from whom the term Arianism comes, denied this claim. The council decided against the Arians overwhelmingly. Of the estimated 318 attendees, all but two agreed to sign the creed and these two, along with Arius, were banished to Illyria. Another result of the council was an agreement on when to celebrate Easter, the most important feast of the ecclesiastical calendar.

(Philippians 2:7-10); **4.** We are saved by grace through faith in Jesus Christ, and through Jesus our relationship with God is restored. (Ephesians 2:8); **5.** Through the Catholic Church which Jesus established while on earth, we have access to grace by Baptism and are nourished by the Eucharist and other sacraments. (Matthew 16:18-19); **6.** Through these sacraments, the Holy Spirit changes us, perfects us, fulfills our every desire, ultimately bringing us to eternal beatitude in heaven. (Matthew 5:48).

Commemorations of the Week MEMORIAL DAY OBSERVED – May 25

Memorial Day, originally called Decoration Day, is a day of remembrance for those


who have died in our nation's service. There are many stories as to its actual beginnings, with over two dozen cities and towns laying claim to being the birthplace of Memorial Day. Memorial Day was officially proclaimed on May 5, 1868 by General John Logan, national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, in his General Order No. 11, and was first observed on May 30, 1868, when flowers were placed on the graves of Union and Confederate



soldiers at Arlington National Cemetery. The first state to officially recognize the holiday was New York in 1873. By 1890 it was recognized by all of the northern states. In 1915, inspired by the poem "In Flanders Fields," Moina Michael who replied with her own poem conceived of an idea to wear red poppies on Memorial day in honor of those who died serving the nation during war. She was the first to wear one, and sold poppies to her friends and co-workers with the money going to benefit servicemen in need. Later a Madam Guerin from France was visiting the United States and learned of this new custom started by Ms. Michael and when she returned to France, made artificial red poppies to raise money for war orphaned children and widowed women. Just as ARMED FORCES DAY (3rd Saturday of May) remembers those currently serving our country; VETERANS DAY remembers those living who have served our country; MEMORIAL DAY remembers those who paid the ultimate price of their lives for our freedom. Let us pause and pray for all those who died to keep us free!

THE THIRD FINDING OF THE HEAD OF THE BAPTIST, JOHN

The Third Discovery of the Venerable Head of the Holy Prophet, Forerunner and Baptist John



occurred in about the year 850 (see the account of the First and Second Discoveries on February 24). The head of St John the Forerunner was found in the city of Emesia during a time of unrest at Constantinople connected with the exile of St John Chrysostom (November 13). It was transferred to Komana during the Saracen raids (about 820-820) and it was hidden in the ground during a period of iconoclastic persecution. When the veneration of icons was restored, Patriarch Ignatius (847-857) saw in a

vision the place where the head of St John the Forerunner was hidden. The patriarch communicated this to the emperor, who sent a delegation to Komana. There the head was found a third time around the year 850. Afterwards, the head was again transferred to Constantinople, and here on May 25 it was placed in a church at the court. Part of the head is on Mt. Athos. The Third Discovery of the Head of John the Baptist is commemorated on May


PENTECOST DINNER CANCELLED; GRADUATES RECOGNIZED - Due to the
