

Public questions on Catholic spirituality, moral & spiritual problems

Q. What is the difference between the Catholic Faith and Mormonism? A. Answer by Catholic Answers: The basic difference is that Mormonism (also called the Church of the Latter-day Saints) is a guasi-Christian religion. That means it uses Christian terms like trinity and god but with different meanings than traditional Christianity. Sometimes, Mormonism actually contradicts traditional Christian doctrine. Although Mormons on the whole emphasize the family, morality, and patriotism, their religion denies fundamental Christian beliefs, most notably the existence of one and only one God (Dt. 32:39; Is. 44:24; CCC304). They believe there are many gods, made of flesh and bone as we are. They teach that a "worthy" Mormon man (but not a merman woman) will become a god and rule over his own planet or planets. Mormonism's founder, Joseph Smith, wrote in the book Teachings of the Prophet, "God himself was once as we are now, and is an exalted man, and sits enthroned in the heavens (pp. 345-347). The Catholic Faith believes there is only one God and that He has always existed (Gen 21:33: Sir 42:21). Other Mormon teachings contrary to the Catholic Faith include the pre-existence of souls, Book of merman, etc.

Faith is measured by doing what He asks (Matthew 14:22-34)

Jesus said get out of the boat. Jesus told Peter he had little faith because he began thinking about the storm and doubted. How much faith did those who never got out of the boat



have? Jesus is telling us to get out of the boat. Afraid of terrorists? Get out of the boat. Afraid to talk to your teenager? Get out of the boat. Talk to them anyway. 
failure, of what people think, of opposition. Think about this...Peter failed at walking on water. He began to sink. But Jesus was right there to pull him up. He'll be there for us, too. It wasn't being right that made Peter the one Jesus chose to carry on after Him. Peter was wrong much of the time, sometimes in very embarrassing ways. It wasn't his fearlessness. He denied Jesus at a crucial moment. It wasn't his careful, diplomatic use of words, he blurted out some of the most foolish things. What was it? Peter was willing to get out of the boat. Let's not be frozen in fear, but in faith, act.

DO NOT SUBMIT TO CASUAL CLOTHING FOR CHURCH

What do you wear to Sunday Mass (Divine Liturgy)? Sadly, seeing super-casual attire at Mass (Divine Liturgy) is all too common. Many who attend

Mass (Divine Liturgy) is all too common. Many who attend look like they're ready for the beach It's not just the women who dress inappropriately at Mass (Divine Liturgy). Men need to be checked too Immodest dress at Mass (Divine Liturgy) is not a comfort problem but a spiritual problem, rooted in an over-sexed culture whose fashion influences have been trickling down into our parishes for decades. The mentality that "It's nobody's business what I wear for Mass (Divine Liturgy) — God knows my heart" reflects a lack of humility and a poor understanding of what's actually




happening at Mass (Divine Liturgy). It also shows a lack of respect for others, disregarding how our immodest dress can become an occasion of sin for the opposite sex. Church is "a house of prayer in which the Eucharist is celebrated and reserved, where the faithful assemble, and where is worshipped the presence of the Son of God our Savior, offered for us on the sacrificial altar for the help and consolation of the faithful" (CCC 1181). Church is not a place where temptation and sin should abound, where sexual distractions should be permitted to compete with our Lord who is present in the sacrament of the altar. When we pray the Lord's Prayer at Mass (Divine Liturgy) we say, "And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil." So, why are we allowing carnal temptations to be openly present? Why are we giving the Evil One permission to prowl throughout our sacred places seeking the ruin of innocent souls? Immodest dress appeals to the flesh I don't believe "modesty custodians" of the type found at some churches in Rome should be stationed at the door of every Catholic church, turning people away if they don't comply with the parish dress code. Nor do I believe that women should come to church dressed like they came right off the set of Little House on the Prairie, or that men should wear tuxedos to Mass (Divine Liturgy) on Sunday. We just need to use common sense when we dress for church.

Saint of the Week — August 5 The Holy Martyr Eusignius of Antioch

The Martyr Eusignius was born at Antioch in the mid-third century. For sixty



years he served in the Roman armies of the emperors Diocletian, Maximian Hercules, Constantius Chlorus, Constantine the Great and his sons. Saint Eusignius was a companion of Saint Basiliscus (March 3 and May 22). and he provided an account of his martyrdom. At the beginning of the reign of Saint Constantine the Great, Saint Eusignius was a witness to the appearance of the Cross in the sky, a prediction of victory. Saint Eusignius retired in his old age from military service and returned to his own

country. There he spent his time in prayer, fasting, and attending the church of God. So, he lived until the reign of Julian the Apostate (361-363), who yearned for a return to paganism. During the time of Julian, two men who were arguing on the street asked him to be their judge. He dispensed justice to the correct one and the man at fault became angry and went to the emperor and accused Eusignius of being a Christian. The emperor summoned Eusignius to court but he strongly denounced the emperor for his apostasy from the Faith and reproached him with the shining example of Constantine the Great. Saint Eusignius stood trial as a Christian before the emperor Julian in the year 362. He fearlessly accused the emperor of apostasy from Christ, and reproached him with the example of his relative, Constantine the Great, and he described in detail how he himself had been an eyewitness to the appearance of the sign of the Cross in the sky. Julian did not spare the aged Saint Eusignius, then 110 years old, but ordered him beheaded.

TRANSFIGURATION: A **SOLEMN HOLY DAY** — Christian theology assigns a great deal of significance to the Transfiguration, based on multiple elements of the narrative. In Christian

teachings, the Transfiguration is a pivotal moment, and the setting on the mountain is presented as the point where human nature meets God: the meeting place for the temporal and the eternal, with Jesus himself as the connecting point, acting as the bridge between heaven and earth. The Transfiguration not only supports the identity of Jesus as the Son of God (as in his Baptism), but the statement "listen to him", identifies him as the messenger and mouth-piece of God. The significance of this identification is enhanced by the presence of Elijah and Moses, for it indicates to the apostles that Jesus is the voice of God "par excellence", and instead of Elijah or Moses, he should be listened to, surpassing



the laws of Moses by virtue of his filial relationship with God. In 2 Peter 1:16–18, echoes the same message: at the Transfiguration God assigns to Jesus a special "honor and glory" and it is the turning point at which God exalts Jesus above all other powers in creation, and positions him as ruler and judge. The Transfiguration also echoes the teaching by Jesus (as in Matthew 22:32) that God is not "the God of the dead, but of the living". Although Moses had died and Elijah had been taken up to heaven centuries before (as in 2 Kings 2:11), they now live in the presence of the Son of God, implying that the same return to life can apply to all who face death and have faith. The faithful bring *Grapes and other fruits of the summer harvest will be blessed. From grapes come the wine at which the transfigured Jesus appears in the Eucharistic Form; and the fruits symbol God's bounty to us His people and His desire to feed us.*

PENITENTIAL PERIOD IN PREPARATION FOR THE DORMITION FEAST — During this



fourteen-day penitential period, the Church prescribes the Paraklis Service be held in honor of the Mother of God. The word "paraklis" has two different meanings: the first is "consolation," from which the Holy Spirit is called the "Paraclete," or "Consoler"; the second is "supplication" or "petition". The Paraklis Service consists of supplication hymns to obtain consolation and courage. It should be recited in times of temptation, discouragement or sickness. It is used more particularly during the two weeks before the Dormition of the Theotokos, from August 1 to August 14. The theme of this Paraklis Services centers

around the petition. "Most Holy Mother of God, save us." Following each of the daily Divine Liturgies we will offer a portion of this service for all our family, relatives and friends who have left our church so that they may return for the sake of their salvation. Also, as we continue in this pandemic era, we will pray the vanquishing of the coronavirus.
