

Public questions on Catholic spirituality, moral & spiritual problems Q. Contraception and marriage—are there ever exceptions? A. Answer by Catholic Answers: The Church teaches that the intention of contraception is contrary to the divine plan. However, there are cases where a medical treatment may have two effects: one is the treatment of a medical condition and the other is contraceptive. In such a situation, so long as the contraceptive effect is not willed and the contraceptive effect is not the means of treatment, the medical treatment is moral. Humanae Vitae (Papal Encyclical on "Human Life"): 15. On the other hand, the Church does not consider at all illicit the use of those therapeutic means necessary to cure bodily diseases, even if a foreseeable impediment to procreation should result there from-provided such impediment is not directly intended for any motive whatsoever.

Byzantine Catholic Ruthenian Metropolitan Directives Regarding the Mentioning of Deceased Names on Sundays & Holy Days (2nd Announcement)

(Many times, parishioners have asked, "why aren't the names of our deceased loved one's



name audibly mentioned at the Divine Liturgy on **Sundays** and Holy Days, but heard many times at a Week Day Divine Liturgy?" The following abridged directive was published by our Bishops on June 25, 1975 regarding this subject and remains in effect to this day).

Norm B: ".... The Divine Liturgy of the **Holy Day** is to be celebrated in its entirety with no intonation or litanies for the deceased (N.B. the priest may pray them silently). Neither is there to be the singing of "Eternal Memory" following the Holy Day dismissal and blessing.

Norm C: "When a Divine Liturgy is taken for the deceased on a **Sunday** (N.B. this includes the Saturday Anticipated for Sunday), it is to be celebrated in its entirety with no intonation or litanies for the deceased. Neither is there to be the singing of Eternal Memory following the Dismissal and Blessing. (N.B. an exception for the singing of Eternal Memory is on certain occasions such as Mother's Day, Father's Day, the passing of a Pope, Hierarch, or Pastor of the Church}. However, no deceased litanies are to be taken unless a Panachida follows the conclusion of the Divine Liturgy.


If you wish to have your loved ones audibly mentioned at the Divine Liturgy, please see that it is scheduled during a week day. The liturgical directives are completely different for those celebrated outside of Sunday's and Holy Days. Be assured that though you may not hear your loved one's name (s) mentioned, the celebrant continues to honor and pray for them and its efficacy is not diminished.— FFAF

8TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

The Fathers of the First 6 Ecumenical Councils — (John 17: 1-13)

Sunday of the Holy Fathers of the First Six Ecumenical Councils Catholic Encyclopedia --HISTORICAL SKETCH OF ECUMENICAL COUNCILS --- The present article deals chiefly



with the theological and canonical questions concerning councils which are Ecumenical in the strict sense above defined. Special articles give the history of each important synod under the head of the city or see where it was held. In order, however, to supply the reader with a basis of fact for the discussion of principles of six of the twenty-one Ecumenical councils with a brief statement of the purpose of each.

First Ecumenical Council: Nicaea I (325) – The Council of Nicea lasted two months and twelve days. Three hundred and eighteen bishops were present. Hosius, Bishop of Cordova, assisted as legate of Pope Sylvester I. The Emperor Constantine was also present. To this council we owe The Creed of Nicea, defining against Arius the true Divinity of the Son of God, and the fixing of the date for keeping Easter.

Second Ecumenical Council: Constantinople I (381) - The

First General Council of Constantinople, under Pope Damasus and the Emperor Theodosius I, was attended by 150 bishops. It was directed against the followers of Macedonius, who impugned the Divinity of the Holy Ghost. To the above-mentioned Nicene Creed, it added the clauses referring to the Holy Spirit and all that follows to the end.

Third Ecumenical Council: Ephesus (431) — The Council of Ephesus, of more than 200 bishops, presided over by St. Cyril of Alexandria representing Pope Celestine I, defined the true personal unity of Christ, declared Mary the Mother of God (*Theotokos*) against Nestorius, Bishop of Constantinople, and renewed the condemnation of Pelagius.

Fourth Ecumenical Council: Chalcedon (451) — The Council of Chalcedon -- 150 bishops under Pope Leo the Great and the Emperor Marcian -- defined the two natures (Divine and human) in Christ against Eutyches, who was excommunicated.

Fifth Ecumenical Council: Constantinople II (553) — The Second General Council of Constantinople, of 165 bishops under Pope Vigilius and Emperor Justinian I, condemned the errors of Origen and certain writings (The Three Chapters) of Theodoret, of Theodore, Bishop of Mopsuestia and of Ibas, Bishop of Edessa; it further confirmed the first four general councils, especially that of Chalcedon whose authority was contested by some heretics.

Sixth Ecumenical Council: Constantinople III (680-681) — The Third General Council of Constantinople, under Pope Agatho and the Emperor Constantine Pogonatus, was attended by the Patriarchs of Constantinople and of Antioch, 174 bishops, and the emperor. It put an end to Monothelitism by defining two wills in Christ, the Divine and the human, as two distinct principles of operation. It anathematized Sergius, Pyrrhus, Paul, Macarius, and all their followers.

"The preaching of the Apostles and the teachings of the Fathers have confirmed the one faith of the Church, which she wears as a garment of truth, woven from the theology on high, as she faithfully imparts and glorifies the great mystery of devotion" (Kondakion of the Feast).

Saint of the Week The Holy Prophet Elijah the Tishbite — July 20 Simple Holy Day — Faithful are encouraged to attend the Divine Liturgy Of all the Old Testament prophets it was St. Elijah (Greek: Elias) the



Tishbite who, in a special way, captured the imagination of our Byzantine Slav people in Eastern Europe The prophet, whose name means "strength of the Lord' was a man aflame with the fire of the love of God and was uncompromising in his faithfulness to the one true God. He was a powerful and courageous figure who had been given power over the elements: rain, wind, fire, etc. St. Elijah lived

during the reign of Ahab, the seventh king of Israel (875-854 B.C.). The king had married Jezebel, the pagan daughter of the king of Tire. She brought with her hundreds of pagan prophets (ritual priests) to Samaria and introduced the worship of the Phoenician deity, Melkart, also known under the general name of Baal. Apart from the sacrifices they offered as part of their priestly function, they observed a special ritual dance accompanied by musical instruments. Every spring they had a ceremony of fire to mark the awakening of their god who had slept through the winter. They enkindled a great fire from which the god was supposed to renew his strength. During this time, the priest-prophets of Baal danced and whirled faster and faster in a frenzy, even to wounding themselves with swords and spears on their arms and legs. Under the influence of Queen Jezebel, the true prophets of Israel were persecuted and the Israelites became divided in their loyalty between Baal and Yahweh. They thought they could worship both, the God of their fathers and the pagan god, Baal, whom the Queen favored. Elijah's' strong and determined opposition to this divided loyalty earned for him the hatred of the gueen. St. Elijah's' loyalty to God and uncompromising faithfulness is a model for those who are straddling between loyalty to God and to the world. Do you know where this icon is located in the (MR) Church?

FEAST OF PASSING OF BLESSED BISHOP-MARTYR BASIL HOPKO — Friday, July



23, marks the passing to eternity of this beloved Byzantine Catholic hierarch. On April 28, 1950, the Communist government seized complete control of Czechoslovakia and liquidated the Presov Eparchy. Bishop Hopko was imprisoned and tortured. Many years of imprisonment and harsh treatment took a final toll on his health. In the Spring of 1968, a liberalization of the Communist regime took place and the government agreed to reestablish the Church. He became chaplain to the Sisters Servants of Mary Immaculate who also took care of him. On **Friday, July**

23, 1976 following a light lunch, and being helped in an easy chair, he gave up his spirit to the Lord whom he loved and faithfully served. The late Pope John Paul II beatified him on September 14, 2004. His relics were solemnly transferred to the Presov Cathedral the following week, and rest beneath the altar adjacent to the chapel of Blessed Paul Gojdich. He was 72 years old. His Feast Day is May 11th. Let us continue to fervently pray for his Canonization. Veneration of his holy relics will follow each Divine Liturgy.

HOLY DAY & BLESSING OF VEHICLES — This Tuesday, July 20, is the Feast of the

Holy Prophet. Elijah the Tishbite. It is an annual custom of our Byzantine Catholic Church to bless vehicles on this day. This beautiful memorial arose from the fact that near the end of his life the Lord sent a fiery chariot from heaven to take Elijah away. This happened in the presence of his disciple Elisha to whom was given double the power of his mentor to carry on the ministry. Since our vehicles are "as fast as the wind" as indicated in the prayer blessing, we pray that God will protect us from harm, and at the



same time praise and thank God for this gift to be able to glorify Him by assisting us in the service of God and neighbor. Please come for the blessing following each Divine Liturgy on July 20 @ 9:00 a.m. (MR) and 6:00 p.m. (NS).
