

National Patriot Day this Week

On September 11, 2001, four planes were hijacked. The hijackers then deliberately

This is particularly true for the relationships between the United States and Islamic countries in the Middle East. 16[™] SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST Love God, Love Neighbor in that Order

Gospel meditation: By the late Msgr. Eugene Chromoga (Mt. 22: 35-46)

A Scribe questioned Jesus: "Master, which is the greatest commandment in the



Law? This subject was often debated in the rabbinic school It was a real issue among the Jewish people. Jesus replied: "You must love the Lord your God with your whole heart and your whole soul, and your whole mind. This is the greatest and the chief commandment. The second is like it, you must love your neighbor as yourself. On these two commandments the whole law and the prophets depend."

Jesus quoted the Book of Deuteronomy (6:5) for the first commandment. This verse is the first part of the "Shema," the basic creed of Judaism. Every Jewish service opens with this sentence. It is also the first text every

Jewish child memorizes. It is contained in the "Phylacteries" the tiny leather boxes devout Jews wear on their foreheads and their wrists when they pray. This is intended to remind of this creed in prayer. The "Shema" is also placed in a little round box called the "Mesurah" and fixed to each door in every Jewish house. They touch this whenever they come in or out to remind them of God. **The second commandment** which Jesus quotes is from the Book of Leviticus (19:18). Man is made to the image and likeness of God. It is for this reason we are to love one another. If we take the love of God away, the love of neighbor becomes sentimentality. Jesus was the first to put these two commandment; we must love God with our total love, a love which rules over our emotions, a love which directs our thoughts and a love which controls all our actions. It is a total commitment of self to God. Our love of neighbor is based on our love of God. It is only when we love God that people become lovable. Love of our fellowman is a sign of love for God.

A Short History of Labor Day

The first Labor Day was celebrated on September 5, 1882, in New York City, when

10,000 workers marched from city hall to Union Square. Those who participated took a day off without pay and voiced their demands. In 1884, the first Monday in September was selected as the official holiday, and the Central Labor Union, who organized the first Labor Day, encouraged organizations in other cities to celebrate the workingman's holiday on that specific date. The concept spread throughout the country and was celebrated in most major industrial cities. The first state law recognizing Labor Day was passed by Oregon in 1887. That same year, four more states, Colorado, Massachusetts, New Jersey and New York, recognized Labor Day. **By 1894**, a total of 28 states have adopted the holiday, and in June



Congress passed a federal act, making the first Monday in September a legal holiday. *President Grover Cleveland signed the bill* right after sending troops to quell a strike against the Pullman railroad company. Have a Happy and Safe Labor Day!

In their humility they prayed to God with tears, to bring them joy in their old age by giving them a child, as He had once given joy to the aged Abraham and his wife Sarah by giving them Isaac. The Almighty and All-seeing God rewarded them with a joy that surpassed all their expectations and all their most beautiful dreams. For He gave them not just a daughter, but the Mother of

God. He illumined them not only with temporal joy, but with eternal joy as well. God gave them just one daughter, and she would later give them just one grandson-but what a daughter and what a Grandson! Mary, Full of grace, Blessed among women, the Temple of the Holy Spirit, the Altar of the Living God, the Table of the Heavenly Bread, the Ark of God's Holiness, the Tree of the Sweetest Fruit, the Glory of the race of man, the Praise of womanhood, the Fount of virginity and purity-this was the daughter given by God to Joachim and Anne. She was born in Nazareth, and at the age of three, was taken to the Temple in Jerusalem. In her young womanhood she returned again to Nazareth, and shortly thereafter heard the Annunciation of the Holy Archangel Gabriel concerning the birth of the Son of God, the Savior of the world, from her most-pure virgin body.
