

Public questions on Catholic spirituality, moral & spiritual problems Q. Is it a misnomer to call someone a "pro-choice Catholic"? **A. Catholic Apologist, Michelle Arnold:** The Church's concern is to teach the doctrine and morality of the Church. In political jargon, "pro-choice" is an inaccurate euphemism used to disguise abortion advocacy. Literally speaking though, to be "pro-choice" simply means to be for choice, or for the freedom to choose. The Church does not dispute anyone's right to choose, *per se*, assuming that the choice is for something either morally good or morally neutral; what the Church disputes is the idea that anyone has a right to choose to murder a human being, which is a morally evil choice. It would be more accurate for someone who advocates for abortion to be called "pro-abortion" than "pro-choice." If someone is a baptized member of the Catholic Church, he is a Catholic, no matter how well or how poorly he lives out his Catholic faith. While we may be rightfully angered that a Catholic who advocates for moral evils such as abortion is presenting himself as a "good Catholic," we should not deny that he indeed is a Catholic (although we can deny that he is a "good" Catholic).



Meditation on today's Gospel

An Allegorical Meaning to the Parable (Luke 10:25-37)

The man that fell among robbers, represents Adam and his posterity; Jerusalem,



the state of peace and innocence, which man leaves by going down to Jericho, which means the moon, the state of trouble and sin: the robbers represent the devil, who stripped him of his supernatural gifts, and wounded him in his natural faculties: the priest and Levite represent the old law: the Samaritan, Christ; and the beast, his humanity. The inn means the Church; wine, the blood of Christ; oil, his mercy; whilst the host signifies St. Peter and his successors, the bishops and priests of the Church. (Origen, St. Jerome, St. Ambrose, St. Augustine, and others)

Since all men possess a rational soul and are created in God's likeness, since they have the same nature and origin, have been redeemed by Christ, and enjoy the same divine calling and destiny, the basic equality of all must receive increasingly greater

recognition. True, all men are not alike from the point of view of varying physical power and the diversity of intellectual and moral resources. Nevertheless, with respect to the fundamental rights of the person, every type of discrimination, whether social or cultural, whether based on sex, race, color, social condition, language, or religion, is to be overcome and eradicated as contrary to God's intent. --- Documents of Vatican II. Pope Francis Speaks Pope's General Audience at St. Peter Square Nov. 10, 2021

Dear Brothers and Sisters, We conclude our series of catechesis on Saint Paul's Epistle to the Galatians. We have seen Paul speak in a variety of ways as apostle, theologian

and pastor, opening up the inexhaustible riches of Jesus Christ. Paul's personal encounter with the Risen Lord led him to proclaim boldly the freedom from sin and death won by Christ's victory on the Cross, and the new life bestowed on us by the Holy Spirit at our baptism. Paul's insistence that charity is the fulfilment of the law should lead us enthusiastically to pursue the way of Christian love and to cultivate the fruits of the Holy Spirit. Nor should we ever grow weary or discouraged by our failures or apparent lack of progress. Saint Augustine evokes the image of Christ asleep in the boat amid



the storm to remind us that whenever we feel weary and the tempests of life threaten to overwhelm us, we need but awaken Christ in our hearts, trusting in his faithful presence and the life-giving power of his Spirit. With Saint Paul, may we constantly rejoice in the newness, joy and freedom of the new life proclaimed by the Gospel and to live by the Spirit and act in a way worthy of the calling we have received in Christ.

Saints of the Week — November 15 **The Holy Martyrs Urias, Samonas & Habib**

The Holy Martyrs and Confessors Gurias, Samonas and Habib: during the persecution against Christians under the emperors Diocletian (284-305) and Maximian (305-311). The two



emperors Diocletian (284-305) and Maximian (305-311). The two friends Gurias and Samonas, preachers of the Word of God, were arrested in the city of Edessa. The saints refused to offer sacrifice to the gods, and boldly confessed their faith in Christ. For this they were subjected to cruel tortures: they were beaten, hung up by their hands, heavy weights were tied to their feet, and they were cast into a stifling prison. The martyrs endured everything with firmness. By night, they were taken out beyond the city and beheaded (+ 299-306). Christians buried their holy bodies with reverence. After some years, the last pagan emperor, Licinius (311-324), began a persecution against Christians. Habib, a deacon of the Church of Edessa whom the emperor ordered to be arrested for his zealous spreading of the

true Faith, presented himself before the executioners when he learned they were searching for him. The saint confessed his faith in Christ and was sentenced to be burned alive. The martyr went willingly into the fire and with a prayer surrendered his soul to the Lord. When the fire went out, the mother and relatives of the saint found his body unharmed. They buried the martyr next to Saints Gurias and Samonas. In an Akathist, the Holy Church addresses the martyrs: "Rejoice, Gurias, Samonas and Habib, Heavenly Patrons of honorable marriage." We pray to them for deliverance from family turmoil, and from marital difficulties, especially where one spouse hates the other without cause.

Through prayer, abstinence, almsgivings of mercy, frequent confession of sins, and additional attendances at the Divine Liturgies we can accomplish

this end. Together as a parish, let us collectively join to practice simple abstinence (no meat) or an equivalent penance on Wednesdays (recommended) and Fridays (required) for the intention for the return of our beloved back to the fullness of the Faith.
