#### Public questions on Catholic spirituality, moral & spiritual problems

Q. Is living together with a significant other still considered cohabitation if there is no sex involved? Are the two different? A. Catholic Apologist statement: For the purpose of this answer, I'll assume by "significant other" you are referring to a romantic partner of the opposite sex to whom you are not married and who is not married to anyone else. (If any of these conditions are not accurate, then the definition of the sexual sin in question changes and may increase in gravity.) Cohabitation between unmarried partners of the opposite sex is an occasion of two sins, not just one. The first is, of course, fornication (sexual relations outside of marriage by an opposite-sex couple). If sexual relations are not occurring during cohabitation, then the couple is not guilty of fornication. They may, however, be placing themselves in a near occasion of sin—which means proximity to the temptation of sin—and we are supposed to avoid near occasions of sin. The other sin is scandal, which is an attitude or behavior which leads another to do evil. The person who gives scandal becomes his neighbor's tempter. He damages virtue and integrity; he may even draw his brother into spiritual death. Scandal is a grave offense if by deed or omission another is deliberately led into a grave offense (CCC 2284). A couple who lives together outside of marriage creates scandal either by allowing people to believe that they are engaging in fornication or by tempting people to believe that cohabitation outside of marriage is okay so long as the couple does not engage in sex. Either way, the couple is creating spiritual obstacles for others, and to do so is indeed an occasion of sin.

(Cont. article) This action is indicated in the catechesis of Pope Innocent III (1198-1216) when delivering the following:

"The sign of the cross is made with three fingers, because the signing is done together with the invocation of the Trinity .... This is how it is done; from above to below, and from the right to the left. because Christ descended from the heavens to the earth, and from the Jews (right) He passed to the Gentiles (left). Others, however, make the sign of the cross from the left to the right, because from misery (left) we must cross over to glory (right), just as Christ crossed over from death to life, and from Hades to Paradise. [Some priests] do it this way so that they and the people will be signing themselves in the same way. You can easily verify this — picture the priest facing the people for the blessing when we make the sign of the cross over the people, it is from left to right."

### **Sunday after the Universal Elevation** of the Precious Cross — Mk. 8:34-9:1

Today is Sunday after the feast of the Universal Elevation of the Cross, and thus the Gospel lesson is about taking up a cross to follow Christ. It also contains an interesting statement: "What will it



profit a man if he gains the whole world, and loses his own soul?" (Mk. 8, 36). If our Lord Himself uses such earthly words as "profit" and "gain", let us make a conclusion using the similar vocabulary: Jesus says that gaining the whole world and losing one's soul is the world's worst bargain." "Let us imagine, for a moment, that man gains the whole world. It cannot keep him from trouble; it cannot give him peace; it cannot comfort him in sorrow; it cannot purchase him immortality and it cannot secure him a place in heaven when he is gone. All he can do with the world, is to keep it until he dies; he cannot carry any of it with him to the other life. "Our

greatest treasure is our soul. Therefore, to lose it would be to lose the most valuable thing we may possess. We lose our souls when we are no longer alive to God and to His love. We lose our souls when we place some other person or thing at the center of life. We lose our souls when we move away from God and no longer experience the power of His presence. And we lose our souls when we feel there is no longer any hope of forgiveness. It was to keep us from losing our soul that God sent His Son to be our Savior. Through Him no person need to lose his soul. Through Him, the door to salvation is always open. Through Jesus we can now become alive toward God and toward our fellow humans. Through Jesus we can gain treasures far greater in value than the entire universe." "The Gospel today tells us how to follow Jesus and how to prepare for heaven, "If we really follow the Lord, He will bless us and secure our eternity, He says, "Whoever loses his life for My sake and the gospel's will save it" (Mk. 8, 35). Losing one's life for Jesus equals saving it for eternity; it equals gaining eternal life. Being tied to God, the soul finds eternal purity. Therefore, let us listen to the words of the Holy Gospel and deny our sinful nature and its inclinations. Let us say "no" to sin and to all that could prevent us from being saved. Let us tie our life to our Savior Jesus Christ, our only Hope who can grant us eternal life and make us gain His everlasting Kingdom!

### **Byzantine Catholics Transmit Ancient Christian Tradition**

All Catholics originally made the Sign of the Cross like today's Byzantines

As we continue the Feast of the Universal Elevation of the Holy, Precious and Life-Creating Cross of the Lord, it is a good time to re-examine the way in which we bless ourselves. As is customary in the Byzantine Catholic Church, we hold the thumb and first two figures together signifying our belief in the Three Persons in One God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. The remaining two fingers are indicative of our belief of who Jesus is: God and man. These two figures are pressed into the palm reminding us that God came to earth and was incarnate of the Virgin Mary. Thus, when we make the sign of the Cross over ourselves, we begin by touching the forehead with the thumb and two fingers together while saying either "In the Name of the Father or Glory to the Father." Our action continues to move down below the heart (near the naval)



signifying that the Son descended to earth to become man, to die and then resurrect from the dead. The movement then is directed to the right shoulder while saying "and to the Son" since He (Jesus) sits at the right hand of the Father. The gesture then goes across to the left shoulder while saying "and to the Holy Spirit. Amen." Historians seem to agree that this is the way Christians began signing themselves around the 8th and 9th centuries. The entirely true believing Christian world used this sign as a gesture to confess their faith, hope and love in the One Who was nailed to the Precious Cross. (cont. on inside)

# Saint of the Day This Week Protomartyr & Equal-to-the-Apostles, Thecla — September 24

The Holy Protomartyr and Equal of the Apostles Thecla was born in the city of Iconium. She was the daughter of rich and illustrious parents, and she was distinguished by



extraordinary beauty. At eighteen years of age, they betrothed her to an eminent youth. But after she heard the preaching of the holy Apostle Paul about the Savior, St Thecla with all her heart came to love the Lord Jesus Christ, and she steadfastly resolved not to enter into marriage, but rather to devote all her life to preaching the Gospel. St Thecla's mother was opposed to her daughter's plans and insisted that she marry her betrothed. St Thecla's fiancé also complained to the prefect of the city about the Apostle Paul, accusing him of turning his bride against him. The prefect locked up St Paul in prison. During the night St Thecla secretly ran away from her house, and she bribed the prison guards, giving them all her gold

ornaments, and so made her way into the prison to the prisoner. For three days she sat at the feet of the Apostle Paul, listening to his fatherly precepts. Neither the tears of her mother, nor her wrath, nor the threats of the prefect could separate St Thecla from her love for the Heavenly Bridegroom, the Lord Jesus Christ. Her mother in an insane rage demanded from the judges a death sentence against her unyielding daughter, and St Thecla was sentenced to be burned. Without flinching, the holy martyr went into the fire and made the Sign of the Cross over herself. St Thecla kept safe by the Lord. After this, St Thecla went with them preaching the

Gospel in Antioch. With the blessing of the Apostle Paul, St Thecla then settled in a desolate region of Isaurian Seleucia and dwelt there for many years, constantly preaching the Word of God, and healing the sick through her prayer. St Thecla converted many pagans to Christ, and the Church appropriately names her as "Equal- to-the-Apostles." When St Thecla was already a ninety-year-old woman, pagan sorcerers became incensed at her for treating the sick for free. They were unable to comprehend that the saint was healing the sick by the power of the grace of Christ, and they presumed that the virgin-goddess Artemis was her special helper. Envious of St Thecla, they sent their followers to defile her. When they came near her, St Thecla cried out for help to Christ the Savior, and a rock split open and hid the holy virgin, the bride of Christ. Thus, did St Thecla offer up her holy soul to the Lord.
